I experienced the trial of having to seek an extension, which teaching staff generously granted, and I'm pleased to say that I passed the subject.

Second semester has me better positioned to undertake the challenges presented. As a mature age student (I can be carbon dated to somewhere around the Jurassic) trying to fit in with a much younger demographic, many students are younger than my children, has been a difficult and lonely experience. When I attended my first lecture, I duly took out my notebook and pen only to see everyone else taking out laptops. Like I said, I'm a dinosaur. Despite this I find it an invigorating experience. UC is a wonderful institution successfully combining a collegiate atmosphere with a social vibe.

Combining part-time study with full-time employment means it will take me eight years to complete my degree. Perfect timing with my retirement from public service. Here's to a new career and many years of community service.
